• Set up direct deposit

You can choose to have claim payments deposited into your bank account. To set up direct deposit, submit a VOID cheque to our insurance service administrator. Contact the service administrator at 1-877-406-9007 or <u>pbclaimsontario@johnson.ca</u> for more information.

Set up your account for online claims
 Online submission is easy and convenient.

 Your first step is to set up your online claims
 account. Choose 'Register' in the 'New to

this' section at <u>insurance.johnson.ca/</u>. Once registered, bookmark the online claims login page or find it anytime on the 'Claims' page in the 'Insurance' section of the RTOERO website.

#### <u>Submit claims right away and file your</u> receipts

Develop a habit of submitting claims right away so you don't forget. Claims must be submitted no later than the end of the calendar year following the year in which the expenses were incurred. Set up a place to store your receipts after you've submitted the claims. Photocopies of receipts are acceptable. Like other financial documents, it's best to keep receipts for seven years.

#### <u>Explore your retirement health coverage</u>

Health insurance can help you stay healthy. It provides peace of mind that your health needs will be taken care of and gives you access to services to help you maintain and optimize your health and well-being. Familiarize yourself with what's covered so you can decide how to use your insurance to best support your health needs. Summaries of the extended health care plan, dental plan and hospital and convalescent care plan, are available on the RTOERO website at rtoero.ca/insurance/.

 <u>Call the claims team before major aids</u> and appliances purchases

Your plan covers a large variety of aids and appliances, including wigs, hearing aids, CPAP units, orthotics and more. We suggest contacting the claims team before your purchase to review the eligibility and maximums and help you get the best value. #### • <u>Carry your RTOERO benefits card with</u> you

You'll need your benefits card at pharmacies and especially when travelling. It's a good idea to keep it in your wallet at all times, so you have our contact information close at hand.  Make sure you have proof of travel dates You don't need to let us know when you're travelling, but you do need to make sure you have proof of your departure and return dates. That could be plane tickets and boarding passes, passport stamp, transaction receipts like gas, hotel or purchase that show travel leaving and returning to your province of residence.

## RTOERO Benefits Report – Shirley Goodbrand

The McMaster Optimal Aging Portal presents weekly factual information and tips on health matters relevant to our age group. You can sign up to receive their weekly topics at mcmasteroptimalaging.org.

Examples of recent topics were promoting brain health, managing osteoarthritis, housing strategies and managing blood pressure. Information is presented in a variety of ways: blogs, articles, elearning etc. It is an easy way to obtain resources to help you lead a healthy lifestyle.

## Political Advocacy – Brenda McGinnis

While most of us did not want an election during a pandemic, this feeling did not stop RTOERO members from participating in this election. It was

very heartening to see many of our members working on campaign teams for the candidate of their choice, advocating for issues they believed in and were promoted by RTOERO, and, most important of all, voting. It was disappointing to see that voter turnout was quite low for this election but I am absolutely positive that our members were among those citizens who exercised their vote.

Thank you to Richard Goodbrand and the Guelph-Wellington Coalition for Social Justice (GWCSJ) for organizing a Zoom "Meet the Candidates" event for Guelph.

The GWCSJ, of which we are a member together with 20 other organizations in Guelph and Wellington County, co-sponsored with Democracy Guelph and Guelph-Wellington Climate Coalition, a Guelph Federal Candidates Virtual Town Hall. Hopefully some of you were able to watch it.

Richard reports that a survey was sent to each registrant:

- Approximately 77% indicated that it was a valuable event.
- 48% of respondents felt that more challenging questions should have been asked.
- Many felt that the candidates should not have had the sponsor questions in advance.
- Others felt that the balance between sponsor and registrant questions should have been more equal.
- Many registrants gave us helpful suggestions for the next time (probably spring 2022 for the Provincial election.

District 31 provided financial support for this Guelph event from a Provincial Political Advocacy Grant and would have provided similar funding for events in the other two Wellington ridings. The Coalition continues to reach out to groups in Wellington County for this type of activity. The group tried to organize a similar event for the other two ridings in our district - Wellington-Halton Hills and Perth-Wellington - but could not find any co-sponsors or interested parties. Shift Action for Pension Wealth and Planet Health is a teacher-based action group proposing that teachers and students "call on the OTPP to improve its disclosure and management of climate risks, exclude fossil fuels from teachers' retirement portfolio, and dramatically increase investments in climate solutions like renewable energy and 9 clean technology".

While important questions have been raised regarding the pension plan, the RTOERO Board confirmed that these issues are not among the primary advocacy goals RTOERO is pursuing on behalf of its members and seniors across Canada. BUT also know that RTOERO supports RTOERO members who have taken or will take individual action to write letters to OTPP in support of this action and RTOERO will continue to monitor this issue. The OTPP has taken action by stating a clear climate change action mandate.

In addition to environmental issues and climate change issues, RTOERO also advocates on behalf of seniors' health and quality of life. One issue that is becoming a serious problem is the dispute between the Ontario Association of Optometrists and the Ontario Government. As you are aware, since September 1st, all seniors' and children's and OHIP eye exams have been suspended. For some children and seniors, this is a very dangerous situation. As always, RTOERO will continue to advocate for a healthier, safer and richer life for its members and all seniors.


