#### Shingles Information from The National Institute on Aging

Shingles is a serious disease primarily affecting older adults. Fortunately, it is largely preventable through vaccination. Before vaccines were developed, one in three Canadians were at risk of developing it over the course of their lives. Canada's National Advisory Committee on Immunization recommends that all adults aged 50 and older be vaccinated; yet only 27% of Canadians aged 50+ report having received the shingles vaccine.

If you have a shingles infection, the painful rash can last sometimes for months or even years. Many of us as older adults had chicken pox as children and, as we age, our Immunization system weakens, resulting in the possibility of a shingles outbreak. The vaccine which is available now boosts your immunization system to give good protection against an outbreak.

The 2013 vaccine gave protection but it did not last. The newer 2017 vaccine offers better protection. Check with your doctor to see if it is right for you.

Ontario Public Health pays the cost of the vaccine for those 65 to 70 years of age. This has been extended to age 73 because of the Covid outbreak. Many health plans also cover the cost of this inoculation. The cost of not having this vaccine can result in a painful rash, time away from things you enjoy doing and a decrease in your quality of life.

Highlights from the 2022 Mid-Year OTPP Report

- six-month and one-year total fund net return of 1.2% and 8.3%
- 242.5B Net Assets June 30, 2022
- The Plan sponsors filed a fully funded valuation with its regulators (107% funded).

Jo Taylor, President and Chief Executive Officer, reported: "These results show that portfolio diversification, active management and an agile investment approach has helped the fund navigate through highly inflationary and challenging market conditions."

Although the total fund net return was only 1.2%, other large pension funds were reporting 0% growth and/or a negative return. The investment landscape will be challenging in the next few years. As one of the largest pension plans in the world, OTPP will continue to invest strategically across key markets to provide steady returns and deliver retirement income for 333 000 members (active and retired).

In 2021, the Partners agreed to file a 2021 funding valuation with the surplus directed to the Contingency Reserve Fund. This Reserve Fund will be used to maintain the current level of benefits and to protect against future increases of contribution rates for plan members and/or having to invoke conditional inflation protection. Having a Continency Reserve Fund provides pension security for members during this period of high inflation and market insecurity. The <u>next</u> required filing (Pension Benefits Act requires a filing to be completed every three years) will be due in 2024.

Retired members will receive a cost-of-living increase to their pensions in January 2023. This is one of the many benefits of a Defined Pension Benefit Plan.

## POLITICAL ADVOCACY REPORT

Recently a friend said something that expressed exactly how many of us have been feeling since the last Provincial election. He said, "Political advocacy is the biggest waste of your time and the most important thing that you can do."

When we saw the dismal, abysmal voter turnout in the Ontario provincial election, many of us felt we had wasted our time completely in trying to get voters engaged in the important issues facing us. The voter turnout of 43.5% was historically low.

Mainstreet took a poll of citizens who didn't vote in the election and found that:

- 45.8% didn't think the candidates were "meaningful different".
- 15.6 % said the campaign lacked "any meaning".
- 20.4% didn't think their vote mattered.
- 8.8% "forgot to vote" and
- 9.3% "didn't have time".

In addition to the disappointingly low voter turnout, many of us felt that the media did not cover the important issues that needed attention, debate and discussion. Issues like climate change and health care were not given enough airtime. Some of us thought that Long Term Care would receive a great deal of discussion and concrete promises for reform. It didn't happen but the issue is back in the news again now and the situation is worse than ever.

It is not surprising that many people involved in political advocacy are discouraged and feel that they are wasting their time. However, the issues facing us are matters of life and death. We are in a climate crisis and a health care crisis. Ageism is a serious threat to our members. Now is the time to continue advocating because this is the most important thing that we can do for ourselves and future generations.

Keeping the importance of political advocacy in mind, the RTOERO website has a very comprehensive, up-to-date section on political advocacy. The work being done in this area by RTOERO is truly impressive. One article I found most helpful is "5 Ways to be an effective and active advocate for critical issues". Each of these steps is explained in detail in the article:

- 1. Engage in ongoing learning on the issue you are passionate about.
- 2. Get to know where your elected officials stand on the issue.
- 3. Join an organization that's already working on the issue.
- 4. Financially support organizations working on the issue.
- 5. Write letters and share your content.

The Ontario Municipal Elections are taking place on October 24th, 2022. Depending on where you live

in Wellington County, you have different options for voting. Some people will be able to vote by mail-in ballots or on-line ballots; whereas other areas will allow only in-person voting. In any case, members are encouraged to vote. Sadly, the voter turnout for municipal elections is even lower than that for Provincial elections. The issues governed by Municipal government also have significant impacts on our lives.

In some areas of the county, Mayors and council members have already been acclaimed. However, it would be helpful to find out where the candidates running for office stand on the issues that matter to you.

# **Guelph Wellington Coalition for Social Justice** - *Richard Goodbrand*

- For the upcoming Municipal and School Board Elections — October 24 — the Coalition is running an education campaign on voting rights and responsibilities. The objective is to encourage the entire electorate in Guelph and Wellington to be informed and to vote.
- We will be posting information in publicly accessible places and on social media and at the Guelph Market. In addition, we will be distributing buttons that can be worn encouraging people to support democracy by voting. There will also be radio interviews on CFRU. GWCSJ continues to be active at the Guelph Market on Saturdays and with Mission Meals in Guelph.

While becoming involved in political advocacy might seem to be a big waste of your time, it really is one of the most important things that you can do to try to save our planet and save and improve our lives.

We would like to acknowledge and celebrate and support the accomplishments and endeavours of our members.

**Nancy Baker** took part in the Elora Community Theatre Outdoor Productions of *The Secret Garden* and *Taming of the Shrew* during the summer. Coming into the house, or moving through it, had to be done carefully and quietly as one never knew where filming was occurring and you did NOT want to walk into a scene! After a full day of shooting, it was done! The length of this film would end up being...nine minutes!! No wonder it takes months to film a full-length feature movie!

#### Dream vacation to nightmare - Lenore Ralph

A trip to the Galapagos Islands was on my bucket list and it was about to come true. The problem? I discovered literally hours before leaving for the airport that the Canadian Government had posted an essential travel only advisory. PANIC!

It was impossible to reach the tour company quickly - on hold for 2.5 hours! Reached out to our RTOERO insurance company and found that I would not be covered if I went on the trip. The tour company requires travel insurance to go to the Islands. I discovered that there would be no refund of any kind from the tour company and RTOERO insurance only covers \$6000 of expenses. I chose to cancel.

If you are travelling, check travel advisories in the weeks before you go as, according to TICO and the tour company, they will not advise you if it is just an "essential travel only". TICO told me that, as long as the airport is open and the hotel is taking guests, you are expected to go. No one seemed to want to address the lack of insurance if you went. The reply I got from the tour company was that travelers should have cancellation and trip interruption, medical and emergency evacuation coverage.

So, a word to the wise, make sure you fully understand what is and isn't covered by our policy and check for government advisories leading up to your trip. If you have a credit card with travel insurance, make sure you understand their policies and maybe consider putting your flight costs on there.

#### How to tell you could use more self-care

As you develop and sustain a self-care practice, you will be more resilient and better able to cope with life's inevitable ups and downs.

Watch for these red flags to help you decide whether you'd benefit from more self-care in your life:

- Depression and anxiety
- Concentration problems
- Increased errors
- Loss of objectivity
- Isolation

#### Have you heard of the term, Intersectionality?

Chances are you have heard about it on the news recently, even if you weren't actually aware of the term.

Intersectionality describes the interconnected nature of various categorizations, including race, age, class, and gender, and how they overlap and impact discrimination or privilege for individuals or groups. The term was originally coined in a 1989 paper by Kimberlé Crenshaw to help explain the oppression of Black women (the intersection of race and gender). Since then, the use of the term has expanded. RTOERO often talks about intersectionality in relation to ageism. For example, gendered ageism, where older women are more likely to be discriminated against, is an example of intersectionality—the intersection of age and sex. Age and race, disability or sexuality are other intersections. When ageism intersects with other biases, disadvantages increase, worsening the impact on health and well-being.
