POLITICAL ADVOCACY REPORT

RTOERO continues to be a strong advocate for its members and for all seniors.

The three topics on which RTOERO focuses its political advocacy are: Seniors Strategy, Geriatric Healthcare and Environmental Stewardship. Environmental Stewardship is again taking the spotlight as we realize that the environment is in crisis and there is an urgency on all our parts to act to try to improve the situation.

RTOERO recently offered its members a Webinar entitled "Everyday Climate Solutions". As is always the case with RTOERO webinars, this was an excellent presentation which provided participants with many good ideas. Other past and upcoming webinars deal with health care and seniors' issues.

The presenter for this most recent webinar was Nikki Sanchez, the former "Queen of Green", at the David Suzuki Foundation.

Nikki pointed out many inconvenient truths and gave practical everyday practices that we could follow to help improve the environment.

She spent a great deal of time talking about the harm that plastic does to the environment. Every day, the equivalent of 2,000 garbage trucks full of plastic are dumped into the world's oceans, rivers, and lakes.

It is also interesting to note that, up until the late 1960s and early 1970s, we did not have plastic. Plastics are actually a by-product of the fossil fuel industry.

Other topics that Nikki touched upon included:

- buying and eating of meat Nikki enjoys eating meat but tries to buy locally and tries to limit eating it to three times a week.
- driving by just reducing our driving by two days a week and by slowing down, we can have a real impact.
- consumption recycling is over-rated; reuse, try not to consume so much stuff (how much stuff do we need?)
- water check hygiene products (some contain harmful products); take short showers over baths; don't run water while brushing teeth; wash clothes in cold water on full loads; recycle paper because it takes a lot of water to make paper.

Nikki did emphasize that individuals are only part of the problem and we can't solve it on our own. It is a system problem and we must work together collectively to have the most impact. By joining like-minded individuals and groups, like the Guelph Wellington Coalition for Social Justice and the Community Carbon Conversations, we increase our chances of being heard by people who make laws and policies.

Martha Foster, former Chair of the Board of RTOERO, asked Nikki to suggest what she considered to be the single most important thing for which RTOERO could lobby the governments to stop the impact of climate change. Nikki suggested that we lobby our politicians to keep our forests, especially our old growth forests, intact. The forests help to stabilize our climate and do the most to slow down climate change. She also suggested that we keep lobbying for the ban of single use plastics.

World Environment Day is June 5, 2024. This year's focus is on the plastic pollution crisis. The 2024 theme for Earth Day was "Planet vs. Plastics". It called us to advocate for widespread awareness on the health risks of plastics, rapidly phase out all single-use plastics, urgently push for a strong global agreement on plastic pollution and demand an end to fast fashion.

Once again to end on a positive, hopeful note, our federal government has taken some actions to address the growing global challenge of plastic pollution, including the launch of the Ocean Plastics Charter during Canada's 2018 G7 Presidency, the introduction of a domestic ban on harmful single-use plastics, the implementation of its comprehensive plan to reduce plastic waste and pollution, and its move towards a circular plastics economy. Canada is also an inaugural member of the High Ambition Coalition to End Plastic Pollution, a group of more than 60 countries representing every United Nations region, with the goal to end plastic pollution by 2024 and develop an ambitious and effective global agreement.



Focus on Aging International Summit

With nearly 25 per cent of Canadians becoming seniors by 2030, and a global demographic shift

towards an aging population, the need for innovative solutions to improve later life is critical. RTOERO, the trusted voice on healthy, active aging, continued to address this need by bringing together global leaders to discuss, share and create strategies to improve later life. RTOERO's inaugural Future of Aging Summit was held on May 15 to 17. The aim was to address the critical and timely issues that a rapidly aging world population poses for healthcare, pension systems, and the labor force, focusing on the Canadian perspective within the global context.

The Summit looked at the trends and opportunities affecting the future of aging in Canada and mapped out cross-sectoral solutions to embrace longevity and prioritize life quality. Fourteen globally recognized aging experts from nine countries tackled the top five themes in aging, with an emphasis on solutions that will benefit Canada's aging population.

- Redesigning workplaces and rethinking retirement policies
- · Reimagining healthcare for aging populations
- Reducing the impact of inequity on healthy aging
- · Improving livable years with age-tech
- Remodelling communities for highly aged societies

Speaker highlights:

- Theo Kocken, director of Your 100-Year Life, presented the first non-academic screening in Canada, and facilitated a discussion about rethinking retirement policies.
- Ritu Sadana, head of Ageing and Health with the World Health Organization looked into the future of aging.
- Hiroko Akiyama, a leading figure in gerontology from the University of Tokyo, discussed community redesign for an aging society
- DY Suharya, founder of Alzheimer's Indonesia, highlighed the importance of grassroots advocacy in effecting systemic change.

 Tomson Highway delivered the closing keynote. Tomson is an award-winning author, playwright, pianist and composer, Cree elder and social worker.

RTOERO's Vibrant Voices Advocacy program underpins the summit's agenda, emphasizing the need for public policy that supports a high-quality life for older adults in Canada. This encompasses improved healthcare services, pension security, and inclusive, age-friendly community planning. Such advocacy not only benefits current seniors but also lays the groundwork for future generations, ensuring a societal infrastructure that adapts to the rapidly changing demographic landscape across Canada and the world.

The forum was well attended by a diverse group including politicians, health care, education, consultancy firms. It was interesting to discuss the issues and solutions with this diverse group at our tables.

A growing number of countries have a seniors/aging advocate. Three of Canada's provinces already have one. Solutions to the issues of aging are the responsibility of governments — Federal, Provincial, Municipal — businesses and unions/organisations representing labour/workers, communities, families, and individuals. Advocacy by and for Seniors must continue to ensure appropriate solutions.

Many communities/countries are finding ways of allowing people to stay in their homes, including use of robotics and AI, shared housing, home health care. Individuals that stay physically, mentally and socially active remain healthier. This includes the possibility of continued employment. The idea that there is a 'magic' age at which all persons must retire is incorrect. And retirement, whenever chosen,

certainly does not mean inactivity and withdrawal from employment or involvement with neighbours and community.

The solutions to having an older population come about by people working together and should not be a 'one size fits all' solution. People must be allowed to choose. There was an opportunity to watch some of the keynote speeches by Zoom. There is a plan for RTOERO to plan and host another summit in 2026. District 31 VP Richard Goodbrand attended the forum.

Message from the Chair, Steve McGirr Ontario Teachers' 2023 Annual Report

I am honoured to chair the board of the Ontario Teachers' Pension Plan and serve the hardworking and dedicated teachers of Ontario, whether they are currently teaching or retired. As the stewards of the plan, we are committed to our members and to delivering on the promise of providing a pension, even during times of uncertainty and change.

Last year was challenging for global investors. There were global conflicts, increasing geopolitical tensions, higher interest rates, economic disruption, supply chain issues and persistent inflation. Despite these various obstacles, our portfolio showed resilience, securing a 1.9% total-fund net return and ending the year with \$247.5 billion in net assets.

I am pleased to report that the plan remains fully funded for the 11th consecutive year with a robust preliminary surplus to ensure stability in contributions and benefits for members.

A strategy designed for the long term

Our goal is to provide excellent service and ensure retirement security for our members. To achieve this, we constantly adapt to changing market conditions while keeping a long-term perspective. We also focus on partnering with businesses and management to create value and ensure success across our global portfolio.

Diversifying our portfolio across different asset classes, geographies and industries helps us manage risk and lower volatility. A significant part of our portfolio is invested in private companies and infrastructure, which have generated strong and steady returns over time. We believe this diversified approach with an emphasis on private assets supports more consistent returns that will fund teachers' pensions well into the future.

We currently pay out more in pensions than we receive in contributions, but our aim is to steadily build our net assets towards the goal of \$300 billion by 2030 to best position us to remain

fully funded.

Looking ahead

As we look to 2024 and beyond, we plan to remain disciplined in the choices that we make. Our primary focus will be to deliver our long-term target of a 4% real return. That said, we will not take undue risks in the pursuit of better returns.

While we expect that we will continue to face a dynamic market environment in the near term, I am confident that we are taking the right approach to proactively assess opportunities that will deliver value to the Plan, our employees and our members.

We strive to live up to our members' high expectations of service. The plan has made prudent investments in people and technology to ensure that we can provide our members convenient, seamless and personalized service, and this increasingly means through digital channels. Our primary performance measure shows that our members remain overwhelmingly satisfied with the service they receive from the plan.

Survivor Benefits

Here is some information about the procedure for obtaining survivor benefits if, sadly, the primary member of the RTOERO Entente Group Insurance Plan dies. Surviving spouses or dependent(s) can become members and enjoy the same benefits.

What to expect:

- Johnson Insurance needs to receive the death certificate. The spouse doesn't need to call or email themselves — a call or email can come from a friend, family member, district goodwill coordinator or funeral home director. Johnson can be reached at: 416-920-7248 or 1-877-406-9007, or by email at healthbenefits@johnson.ca.
- Johnson Insurance sends the surviving spouse or dependent a continuation of benefits form and postage-paid envelope.
 The form needs to be completed and sent back.
- The surviving spouse or dependent will then become an RTOERO member if they aren't already. They will be enrolled in the Entente benefits.
- All historical file notes and claims history will transfer to the surviving spouse's record. They'll receive a new benefits package, card, and a welcome package from RTOERO.
