Benefits Report - Shirley Goodbrand

This report is based on Benefits Meeting November 10, 2021.

PLAN CHANGES FOR 2022

Most benefit plans do not make frequent changes. Ours is examined every year. There will be no premium increase for 2022. The premiums collected are applied to the benefit plan.

Some highlights of plan improvements that started on January 1, 2022:

The dental plan has been revised, making it easier to understand and use. There is more basic and preventive coverage, and implant surgery will now be eligible

There's exciting news about prescription drug coverage. Using the Express Scripts Canada PharmacyTM, you can receive 100% reimbursement for generic prescriptions for maintenance drugs – with several convenience services; however, for snowbirds, there is no shipment of drugs to the United States

Occupational therapists have been added to the list of paramedical practitioners covered by the Extended Health Care Plan.

There was more use made of the health plans in 2021, compared to 2020. As well, there were increases to the cost of goods and services covered by the health plans. Despite these factors, we expect a small surplus at year-end for our plan.

It is expected that there will be more use made of the benefit plans next year as the COVID-19 recovery continues – and that has been addressed within the plan. A reserve was created especially for an expected increase in travel claims in 2022 and beyond.

Member Survey Results

The results of the member survey revealed an overall high levels of member satisfaction with our health plans.

The health plans continue to be the top reason members join RTOERO – and keep their membership throughout retirement.

90% of members are satisfied with the Extended Health Care Plan.

88% would recommend the Extended Health Care Plan to a friend or colleague.

88% agree there is a good balance between coverage and affordably.

The **Communiqué**, which outlined the changes for

2022, was emailed to all plan members. Please refer to that document. If you can't locate the emailed version, it is available on the RTOERO website.

Dental Plan

There were significant changes to the Dental Plan:

Dental Plan reimbursements will be updated to the 2022 fee guide for general practitioners.

Scaling will be covered under the Basic and Preventive benefit, with 85% reimbursement.

Minor Restorative coverage for work such as root canals or gum surgery will continue to be reimbursed at 80% to a maximum of \$800.

Dental implantation surgery will be eligible.

See the article on page 6 and 7 of the Communique for more details about the changes to the Dental Plan.

Eligibility Plan Changes

A spouse or dependent child can join a plan without the policyholder also being insured, within the same plan, if the RTOERO member is a policyholder with at least one other plan.

RTOERO members not participating in the Dental Plan can add this coverage with guaranteed acceptance. The 12-month limit of \$500 for late applicants has been removed. Instead, we simply require that late applicants to the Dental Plan remain enrolled for at least 24 months.

It was also stressed that members should not hold their claims to the end of the year. The staff is inundated with submissions at that time. They do their best but they can't hire more staff for this crunch time.

A new Benefit Booklet will be printed in 2023. The website booklet will be updated for January 2022.

Political Advocacy – Brenda McGinnis

4th Annual Queen's Park Advocacy Day

RTOERO recognized the International Day of Older Persons on October 1st with our 4th Annual Vibrant Voices Queen's Park Advocacy Day in Ontario. For the second year, due to the pandemic, our advocacy event was fully virtual. Members of the Board of Directors, Political Advocacy Committee and senior staff worked in groups to connect with more than 25 elected officials and government staff to talk about our three advocacy issues and specific actions we are looking for government to take. Our three advocacy issues are: Seniors Strategy, Geriatric Health Care, and Environmental Stewardship.

Vibrant Voices 2021 Webinar Series

As part of its Vibrant Voices program in 2021, RTOERO hosted a series of six webinars for members and interested stakeholders about our advocacy issues. More than 2,000 people attended these excellent sessions and were given the opportunity to hear from Canadian experts on the topics of geriatric health care, seniors strategy and environmental stewardship. I was able to attend all of these and highly recommend that members accept this year's invitations to these webinars. Ontario Provincial Election, June 2, 2022

An election resource package is being prepared by Simon Leibovitz for districts with information on meeting with candidates, organizing all-candidates' meetings, and how various parties' platforms mesh with RTOERO's advocacy issues.

District Regional Political Advocacy Committee Meetings

One of the positive aspects of the pandemic is that we have been able to meet on Zoom with PAC reps from other districts. I have really enjoyed meeting with Districts 9, 10, 11, 17, and 39 on a regular basis. We exchange ideas and discuss issues and someone from central office takes minutes and sends out a report on the discussions from all the regions. These meetings are very helpful and enjoyable. Two issues have been dominating our discussion: concern about the environment and the issues surrounding Long Term Care.

Long Term Care

In a recent member survey, 90% of RTOERO members rated the transformation of Long Term Care as a top issue of concern. This must be one of the issues for which we advocate strongly during the provincial election. In an article in The Toronto Star, on December 5, 2021, written by Ann Silversides, an independent health policy journalist who has written extensively on long term care. She notes that "When Ontario reached 10,000 deaths from COVID-19 last week, it wasn't widely noted that residents of long term care homes accounted for 40 per cent of that grim tally". She also noted that "By mid-2021, Canada had the highest proportion of long-term care deaths of any G20 country and it spent on average 30 per cent less on this care than its counterparts". Ann is also very worried that the proposed Ontario legislation - the Fixing Long Term Care Act, 2021 - is not what we have been promoting. "Far from introducing reform, Ontario is enshrining the status quo." We must work hard to advocate for meaningful reform in the delivery of Long Term Care and, equally important, home care for the vast majority of seniors who want to remain living in their homes for as long as possible.

On a Lighter Note

For Christmas, I received a truly great gift of Terry Fallis' new book, <u>Operation Angus</u>. It is the third book in his series and follows the antics of MP Angus McLintock and his chief of staff, Daniel Addison, whom we met in <u>Best Laid Plans</u> and <u>The</u> <u>High Road</u>. If you enjoy political stories with a strong twist of satire and humour, you will enjoy these books very much. They are a real treat.

Membership—Scott Montgomery

As the New Year of 2022 begins, we look forward to new beginnings; having safe, socially distanced conversations outside with friends; and safely connecting ourselves with our communities.

Our most recent membership numbers include:

- 1 377 retired educators, which include 11 new recently retired educators
- 48 actively working RTOERO members
- 53 members are over the age of 90
- 7 of our members are under the age of 54.

If you have friends who are still working in schools, please remind them that they can join RTOERO before they retire without an annual fee. When they retire, the annual membership fee and benefit fees are less than other educational insurance plans.

Inflation Increases Effective January 1, 2022

Ontario Teachers' Pension Plan (OTPP) - 2.4%

Ontario Municipal Employees Retirement System (OMERS) – 2.74%

Canada Pension Plan (CPP) - 2.7%

Old Age Security (OAS)

Quarterly Inflation Adjustment (January, April, July, October)

Effective January 1, 2022, the monthly payment will be \$642.25 and the clawback starts when the Net Income (from all sources) exceeds \$79 845.

Reminders:

Each person has to apply for the OAS prior to age 65.

Your OTPP will be reduced when you reach age 65 to reflect the deduction for the CPP offset.

The deduction for the CPP offset starts in the month you reach age 65.

Local RTOERO district supports food programs for students

Guelph, Dec. 3, 2021 – For children, food insecurity is a growing problem in Guelph and Wellington and affects their ability to perform at their best in school. A \$2 500 grant from District 31 Wellington of RTOERO will support the Food & Friends program to bring healthy food to hungry minds.

Food & Friends is offered through the Children's Foundation of Guelph and Wellington (<u>childrensfoundation.org</u>). The program includes breakfast, snack and lunch programs offered throughout Wellington County.

The District 31 funding is part of RTOERO's annual Community Grants program. Districts apply for individual projects (education-related or other community initiatives) that support local programs. Up to \$2 500 per project is available. Since 1968, RTOERO has been a voice for those who work in, and retire from, the education sector. Our mission is to improve the lives of our members and seniors.

"No child should go through their day hungry. Supporting Food & Friends is about proving nutrition, improving learning abilities, and creating an atmosphere of social inclusion for students who may otherwise feel marginalized," says M. Anne Smith, President, District 31 Wellington.

Each year, a committee of RTOERO members assesses the merits of each Grant submission. For 2021, RTOERO funded 31 projects for a total of \$79 885. Since the inception of the Community Grants program 21 years ago, RTOERO has donated \$1.85 million to more than 525 programs and projects.

"RTOERO members care about their communities and serve them every day," says Rich Prophet, the chair of the board at RTOERO. "The Community Grants program encourages all of our districts to support and partner with outside organizations, and to give back."
